



THE GOSPEL Luke 16:1-13

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ

according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

"Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

THE NICENE CREED





born of your servant Mary,


to fulfill your Law, opening for us the way of freedom and peace.





Our world: For the people of Iran, Lebanon, Haiti, Palestine, Israel, Ukraine, the Sudan, and all other places of violence and war, that peace and justice may prevail, and human fear and suffering diminish. In the sixth century, **the "filioque" clause** referring to the Holy Spirit crept into the Nicene Creed in the Church in the West (Roman) without consultation or agreement from the Church in the East (Orthodox): "...Holy Spirit, who proceeds from the Father **and the Son**." The Episcopal Church meeting in general Convention in 1994 agreed to remove the clause in the next revision of the Book of Common Prayer. In the meantime, since Grace Church prints the creed text in our bulletins, we have removed the clause and adjusted musical settings to put the Episcopal Church's intention into practice.

CREATION SEASON 2025

A REFLECTION from JACK KAMPS, GIDEON'S GARDEN DIRECTOR

Robin Wall Kimmerer writes in the chapter "In the Footsteps of Nanabozho: Becoming Indigenous to Place" of her book *Braiding Sweetgrass*: "Our immigrant plant teachers offer a lot of different models for how *not* to make themselves welcome on a new continent. Garlic mustard poisons the soil so that native species will die. Tamarisk uses up all the water. Foreign invaders like loosetrife, kudzu, and cheat grass have the colonizing habit of taking over others' homes and growing without regard to limits. But Plantain is not like that. Its strategy was to be useful, to fit into small places, to coexist with others around the dooryard, and to heal wounds. Plantain is so prevalent, so well integrated, that we think of it as native. It has earned the name bestowed by botanists for plants that have become our own. Plantain is not indigenous but 'naturalized."

With this in mind, reflect on the following questions:

- What do your more-than-human neighbours have to teach you about become native or naturalised to the place(s) where you reside?
- How do they live and grow?
- How do they relate to their neighbours?
- How do they relate to you?
- How do you relate to them, and how might you grow into relating with them?

Also: The inaugural **Homelands PowWow** is a new gathering held on the ancestral homelands of the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohican Indians, October 4–5 on the grounds of Darrow School in New Lebanon, NY.

Even if you are unable to attend the PowWow, there is a call for art made by community members that demonstrates our connection to the river and watershed, to be submitted by September 30 at Big Elm Brewery in Great Barrington.
